The ongoing dispute between the representatives of the “Counties” and the City of Philadelphia on one side and the “Territories” on the other culminated with the appearance of 12 representatives of the Territories in Philadelphia on 10 April 1704 agreeing to join the deliberations of the Assembly, contingent upon the reduction of the members from Chester, Bucks and Philadelphia so that the Territories would have equal representation. The proposal was rejected and the territorial representatives were not seated. The Territories would set up a separate political structure which eventually evolved as Delaware.
